	 prophets". In other words, God's promise through the prophets (including John) to humanity in the OT/NT will be fulfilled after the seventh trumpet. When will Jesus return? Several texts in the NT suggest that many in the early Church expect Christ's return in glory to happen in their lifetime. Therefore, it is necessary for Paul to dispute this misinterpretation. Jesus has already explained no one knows the day or the hour except the Father. "Therefore, keep awake – for you do not know". They must pay attention and lead "lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God". 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Special Notes:

- 1. In composing the sacred books, God chose men and while employed by Him they made use of their powers and abilities, so that with Him acting in them and through them, they, as true authors, consigned to writing everything and only those things which He wanted. Therefore, since everything asserted by the inspired authors or sacred writers must be held to be asserted by the Holy Spirit, it follows that the books of Scripture must be acknowledged as teaching solidly, faithfully and without error that truth which God wanted put into sacred writings for the sake of salvation. Therefore "all Scripture is divinely inspired and has its use for teaching the truth and refuting error, for reformation of manners and discipline in right living, so that the man who belongs to God may be efficient and equipped for good work of every kind" (2 Tim. 3:16-17) (Dei Verbum, Divine Revelation, n.11)
